President's Report

I can't believe it's the holiday season again! Time goes by so quickly! It's been another fantastic year in Henry Farm.

We were thrilled to have **MPP Jonathan Tsao** join us as our guest speaker for this year's AGM. Over the years, we've had great conversations with our city councillor, **Shelley Carroll**, who's helped us navigate many of the city's changes in our neighbourhood. We wanted to widen that lens a bit. Having a provincial voice gives us a better understanding of the bigger picture—how decisions at Queen's Park shape life right here in Henry Farm.

And, not to leave anyone out, we've also invited **MP Maggie Chi** to join us in the new year, so we'll have the federal perspective covered, too. It's important for us to have these one-on-one connections—it helps us understand where our governments are heading, and it gives them a chance to hear directly from the people who actually live here and how it all connects back to our little corner of the city.

There are other changes we will need to stay aware of. Zoning changes for retail and multiplexes, Sheppard subway and lane updates, ongoing developments in the surrounding streets, school board changes and of course, traffic calming measures in Henry Farm. Several streets were part of a traffic study report, and George Henry Boulevard between Farmview and Manorpark Court has satisfied the Traffic Calming Policy and been recommended for speed bumps on George Henry. The councillor's office will reach out to the HFCIA to organize a meeting to address these findings, along with other street results.

It takes a lot of dedication (and maybe a little caffeine) to make these events happen and to keep our neighbourhood as vibrant as it is. For a small community of around 800 households, the turnout and enthusiasm at every event are remarkable.

From Neighbour's Night Out, to community sessions with NYGH, Options in Aging, Toronto Fire Prevention, and evenings with our government representatives—to our annual city cleanup in April—and, of course, our proudest moment: The Henry Farm Gives Back Parade.

This year, we raised \$750 and four truckloads of food for the North York Food Bank. That's what community looks like—neighbours helping neighbours.

And speaking of teamwork, our collective efforts made real change happen with the bylaw at **28 Silkwood**. Because of your voices, the city reviewed zoning applications and adjusted **www.henryfarm.ca**

rules around bedroom sizes and home structures. While the city continues to explore multiplex housing, we can be proud that Henry Farm helped shine a light on areas that needed improvement—and made sure builders are held accountable.

None of this would be possible without our **sponsors** and **volunteers**. If you've ever thought about getting involved, please do! Whether you helped set up an event, delivered flyers or donated to a cause, every bit of effort makes a difference. It's incredibly rewarding and a great way to meet your neighbours.

As this is my last President's report, I wanted to say thank you. It's been five years of laughter, learning, new ideas, teamwork and plenty of emails at 11 p.m. It's truly been an honour to help this community, and I've loved every minute of it. This neighbourhood is truly something special, and it's been such an honour to be part of it in this way.

I also appreciate all of you — the HF members, the volunteers, and the HFCIA executive team — for your support, your ideas, and your encouragement. You've made the president's job an absolute joy.

And I'm so grateful for the support, ideas, and encouragement I've received from all of you—our Henry Farmers.

So, thank you—from the bottom of my heart—for making this neighbourhood what it is.

If you've been driving through the neighbourhood lately, you've probably seen the new 30 km/h signs going up. These are part of the City's Area Local Speed Limit Reduction Program, and they mark an important shift in how we keep our communities safe. Across Don Valley North, all local roads are being brought down to 30 km/h. In Henry Farm, this includes every street except Havenbrook Boulevard from Shaughnessy to Don Mills, and Shaughnessy Boulevard itself, which will be marked at 40 km/h.

I know speeding has been a long-standing concern, especially along George Henry and Havenbrook, and these changes are meant to help. Once the new limits have been in place for a bit and we can see how drivers adjust, we'll be in a better position to consider additional measures like speed humps. I truly do want to hear your thoughts on that. Your lived experience on these streets is invaluable.

This year, I've probably spent more time thinking about safety than at any other point in my public service career. As Chair of the Toronto Police Service Board, I've been working closely with the Service to support improvements they've wanted to make for a long time. City-wide, we're seeing real progress: major crimes are down 10.3% year-to-date, homicides have dropped by 53.9%, auto thefts are down 30.5%, robberies are down 16.2%, and break-and-enters have decreased by 12.5%. These city-wide improvements are encouraging, but neighbourhood-level concerns matter just as much.

That's why I'd love for you Join me on **Wednesday**, **December 3** at Divine Mercy Catholic School for a Community Safety Town Hall, co-hosted with Superintendent Donovan Locke of 33 Division. This is your opportunity to hear directly about the work underway to keep Henry Farm safe, the progress we're making together, and the next steps ahead. You'll also have plenty of time to ask questions and share your concerns. I hope to see you there...

NYG Teams Recognized for Excellence in Care

Surgery Program Ranks Among the Best Internationally

NYG's Surgery Program has been recognized by the American College of Surgeons (ACS) National Surgical Quality Improvement Program (NSQIP) as a global leader in delivering outstanding quality in adult surgical care. Out of 609 hospitals participating in the program, NYG ranked in the top 10 percent, achieving "meritorious outcomes" in all surgical categories, including higher-risk cases. Notably, NYG is one of only four Canadian hospitals to receive this distinction for two or more consecutive years.

"This recognition follows a rigorous evaluation of our surgical program and affirms that our hospital not only meets—but exceeds—internationally recognized standards for quality and safety," says Dr. Peter Stotland, Chief of Surgery and Co-Medical Director of Surgery at North York General. "Our entire surgical team should be proud of this achievement and their steadfast dedication to delivering high-quality care."

NYG's surgical team performs over 38,000 procedures annually, leads Ontario in wait times for cancer surgeries, and has pioneered advanced techniques in Ontario by using robot-assisted knee replacements and in Canada by offering transperineal biopsies for prostate cancer.
